he season of Epiphany begins with urgency. The Wise Men searched. Herod raged. Joseph and the holy family fled. Mark's Gospel — the Gospel used for the three-year series of Scripture readings this church year communicates this urgency over and over again.

After Jesus' Baptism, He immediately "saw the heavens being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove" (MARK 1:10). Two verses later, "The Spirit immediately drove [Jesus] out into the wilderness" to be tempted (MARK 1:12).

Mark uses the word "immediately" 40 times in his Gospel, in every chapter except two. It means "at once," "as soon as," or "straightaway." It pushes us straight into the next movement of Jesus' mission to save humanity from its fallenness and sin. It is a word of urgency in a Gospel of urgency.

Why so urgent?

Because the trials and struggles of our broken lives and sinful world

pose urgent eternal danger (MARK 4:15-17).

Because Christ's imminent return causes urgent concern for the eternal life of all (MARK 4:26-29).

Because all people have an urgent need for Jesus' comfort and strength during life's storms (MARK 6:47-51).

Because forgiveness and salvation through Jesus Christ is the only answer for the urgent condition of being lost and separated from God (MARK 15:1-5).

Mark's Gospel skips the Christmas account and starts with Isaiah's words: "Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him" (MARK 1:3). The word for "straight" is related to the word "immediately." Mark is a "pointer," not a "painter." He doesn't tell the long version of the story. He gets to the point and points us to what we need to know and do right now.

Introducing John the Baptist, Mark notes: "John appeared, baptizing in the wilderness and proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" (MARK 1:4). Repentance is urgent. It is so easy to get distracted from the Gospel and become captivated by our causes, preferences and ways. Called back to the Way and the Truth and the Life, we fall before our Savior uttering the humble and truthful Spirit-led plea, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" (LUKE 18:13). The church and the world urgently need us to be people of repentance.

By grace we are returned to Jesus, and by grace we are led by Him. The disciples immediately left their nets – their livelihood and personal standing - to follow Jesus as fishers of men (MARK 1:17-18). Following Jesus as fishers of men is urgent. Nearly 75 percent of people in Texas do not consider attending church a priority and may not know Jesus as Savior. What "nets" do you need to drop so that sharing the Gospel shining the Epiphany light of Jesus the Savior – can be the urgent priority in your life, in your congregation, and in your ministry?

Prayer starter: Ask God to bring clarity, focus, and urgency to your Gospel calling in 2024.

'Exponential'

More than 70 LCMS leaders from across Texas recently traveled to Tennessee to take part in Learning Communities, held by Exponential. Over a day and a half, participants were encouraged by stories of ordinary Christians who are actively witnessing. We were invited into a culture in which it is considered "normal" for disciples to make disciples who make disciples. Our facilitators helped us think through our current contexts and assisted us in making plans for further Kingdom multiplication.

Exponential (*exponential.org/lc*) inspires and equips leaders "to change the primary metrics of success in the Church from addition to multiplication, and from accumulation to releasing. The Multipliers Learning Communities were created to help forward-thinking leaders engage in peer-to-peer learning about the future of the church. The Learning Community journey consists of three separate gatherings in three different cities over a seven-month period (from Fall 2023 to Spring 2024). The journey combines the relational, experiential and informational components required for transformation. Learning Community attendees build lasting connections with fellow church multipliers while gaining the innovative ideas that will lead to implementing an action plan in their local context."

The day after we returned, one participant followed up by texting a group of fellow travelers: "Super blessed by the past few days. Grateful for each of you in my life and connection to what the Holy Spirit is doing in our midst. My ministry partner and I had deeper conversations about discipleship in our context than we have had in a long while. I am grateful for the space to do so."

Another emailed members of our Texas District Mission Team: "I am writing for the express purpose of thanking you for the vision and for setting a culture that takes risks in the Exponential ministry. I thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to listen/learn as the model was presented over the two days in Nashville. The opportunity to dialogue with men and women who are eager to share the message and allow the Spirit to move them to action was inspiring. Thanks to whomever sought this, found a way to finance it, and for the culture that isn't "permission-giving" but rather is "opportunity seeking" and willing to take risks. Thanks to those who asked me to be a part of this movement. I'm grateful to be around to witness this prayerful effort at renewal and rebirth."

For me personally, one of the greatest blessings of this experience was made clear at our final lunch together before flying home. Sitting down randomly with a group of Texas District participants, my table mates were senior and associate pastors, church planters, a college intern, an evangelist trainer and a children's ministry director. As we waited for our lunch to arrive, each of us shared the place of our birth and the occupation of our parents. Remarkably, the leaders whom God is positioning here in Texas "for such a time as this" have been gathered from the far corners of the earth: Honduras, Colombia, Argentina, Chile, Mexico, Texas, Missouri, and (even) Iowa.

We should not be surprised. For the Lord declares:

"It is too small a thing for you to be my servant to restore the tribes of Jacob and bring back those of Israel I have kept. I will also make you a light for the Gentiles, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth." ISAIAH 49:6

I have been thinking a lot about characteristics of Jesus.

His patience.

His kindness.

His goodness.

His generosity.

When I think of His patience, I am reminded of his constant love for me, even when I am incredibly unlovable.

When I think of His kindness, I can't help but think of the Samaritan woman at the well.

When I think about His goodness, I think of five loaves of bread and two fish.

A traditional LCMS congregation, Crown of Life offers Divine Service at 8 and 10:45 a.m. on most Sundays. Special festival and midweek services are held throughout the church year. An education hour for all ages begins at 9:30 a.m.

The Lutheran faith focuses on the Good News of Jesus Christ and His redeeming work on the cross and His open and empty tomb. Individuals, couples and families will discover a faithful family in Christ at Crown of Life.

50 YEARS of Our Savior

Our Savior Lutheran Church (OSL), Austin, celebrated its 50th anniversary with a year-long series of Decade Sundays, leading up to a Grand Jubilee on Nov. 4 and a Jubilee Worship on Nov. 5.

On July 22, 1973, a group of 26 people met for the first time in the chapel of the Texas District office. The following October, OSL broke ground on its permanent facility and on Nov. 11, the church was chartered. In 1990, following the loss of a significant portion of its property to road expansion by the city of Austin, the congregation moved from its original site to its current location.

OSL's pastors through the years included Revs. James Noffke (1973–84), Gordon Albers (1984–97), Keith Gravesmill (1998–2012) and Eric Borchers (2014–present).

In the fall of 1974, an early childhood program serving pre-kindergarten 3 and 4 year olds began, and in 1984 a school serving those grades was established. The school and childcare program grew to serve infants through grade 5 until its closing in 2017 due to financial constraints.

Today, the congregation is focusing on living out its mission of "sharing

LCMS Disaster Response, among other ministries. The "50 for 50" Jubilee program challenged OSL families to donate 50 hours of community service in celebration of the 50 years of blessings showered on OSL. The challenge was met with over 1,200 hours of external community service recorded to date. This year, more than 500 Thanksgiving meals will be prepared and served for families in need.

In the last two years, OSL was also privileged to temporarily open its doors to Concordia High School and Austin Achieve Charter School and is actively seeking partnerships to continue to bring children and families into a nurturing, Christian environment.

OSL is a blessed people looking forward to the next 50 years in anticipation and confident of God's plan to prosper His church on earth.

Giving Back What She's Been Given:

Lillian's BeREAL Story



Lillian was a child in foster care who would like to help foster children when she graduates from college. Upbring BeREAL gave her the necessary support to pursue her dream.

eet Lillian Davis, a resilient 24-year-old who has charted her own course to success. In 2022, Lillian proudly graduated from Texas A&M University–San Antonio with a degree in sociology. Undeterred by challenges, she is currently pursuing her masters' degree at the University of Texas–San Antonio while making a significant impact as a Court Appointed Special Advocate through her internship.

Lillian's journey is a testament to her unwavering determination to reshape her destiny. Growing up amidst familial struggles due to her mother's substance abuse and an absent father, Lillian found herself under the care of her maternal grandparents and facing economic hardships. At the age of 16, she entered the foster care system in San Antonio, and was placed in a loving foster home through Upbring Foster In Texas.

As a young adult in foster care, Lillian was eligible for free college tuition, which opened the doors to higher education. However, faced with challenges while in the Supervised Independent Living (SIL) program, which imposed restrictive living conditions, Lillian sought independence. Recognizing her need for autonomy, Upbring became part of her life again — this time through our BeREAL program which became a catalyst for her journey. BeREAL became the cornerstone of Lillian's pursuit of self-sufficiency. While still an SIL, it offered Lillian an apartment of her own and the "me" time she yearned for.

"It's a really good step to independence but still having people come in to check on you to make sure you're alright," Lillian said about BeREAL. "It's not too overbearing and it's very supportive."

Tailored for young adults aged 18-21 transitioning from foster care to independence, BeREAL provided Lillian with not only a supportive living environment, but also crucial life skills and career coaching. Now Lillian is not just rewriting her story; she's crafting a narrative of triumph and empowerment, determined to define her own success and make a lasting impact on the world around her.

In the future, Lillian would like to work with foster youth and help promote education. For now, to prepare for her career, Lillian observes supervisor's meetings and court hearings. 'Create in me a clean heart'

As we may be focusing on the resolutions for 2024, it is a good time to also focus on a renewed relationship with our Lord. We read in Psalm 51:10-12:

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit.

Psalm 51 was composed by David as a confession to God after Nathan the prophet had informed David of God's judgment against him because of his adultery with Bathsheba and the murder of Uriah, her husband. The psalm begins with:

Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!

This is an excellent confession and prayer to use as you begin the new year. Getting right with our Lord should be a very high priority for all of us. The beginning of the new year is a perfect time to begin a new prayer regimen. Prayer is your conversation with the Lord. He wants us to communicate with him as often as possible.

We are given a promise that He will hear our prayers. It is interesting to listen to prayers at church on Sunday morning. How many of those prayers ask the Lord for blessings — and how many of those prayers thank the Lord for blessings already received?

We need to keep the asking side and the thanking side more in balance. We need to reconcile ourselves with God by remembering to thank God in all our prayers. The psalmist asked for that when he prayed "Create in me a clean heart, O God and renew a right spirit within me." A "right spirit" says, "Thank you Lord, for my Savior and Your manifold, unending blessings."

Try this prayer next time: "Dear Lord, forgive my ingratitude. Instead, give me a new heart that is filled with joy in Jesus and all the other temporal and eternal blessings His sacrifice gives. In His name. Amen."

WonderFull World Retreats

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life." JOHN 3:16

In September and October, LWML Texas District held three retreats in which 118 ladies heard the message that God's love is with us everywhere. God's love is Awesome! Extravagant! Vast! Amazing! Wonderful!

We explored many wonders on our trip around the world with this re-

treat. We wondered if anyone really cares about us ... how life would be different if we were royalty ... if we matter to God ... where God is when life is hard ... if we can really rely on God ... and if we can make a difference. As we wondered, we confirmed God's Word has *the* answers. We know we can turn to God, our Bibles and fellow Christians as we go through those times of wondering and as we go into the future.

At these retreats, we also shared God's love with others. We made

blankets that say "God loves me!" as a tangible demonstration of love. These blankets were shared with pregnancy centers and other locations.

Everyone wonders about the future. The Bible answers this wonder too. We can read Jeremiah 29:11 or Psalm 139:16. But more guidance can be found in Proverbs 3:5-6 (NLT):

Trust in the LORD with all your heart; do not depend on your own understanding. Seek His will in all you do, and He will show you which path to take.

Mission Grant Spotlight

Houston Coalition for Life (HCL) was a grateful first-time recipient of an LWML Texas District grant in 2022. Funds enabled the purchase of Christian devotionals — *Dear Mother*, *Christmas Story*, and *Redeeming Mama* — as well as 200 Bibles to be given to the women in crisis pregnancies served by HCL.



Founded with the mission of ending abortion in Houston peacefully and prayerfully, HCL operates five Blue Blossom pregnancy centers, including four mobile crisis units: Big Blue, Baby Blue, Little One, and Little Two, and the main office. All offer free pregnancy tests, free ultrasounds, and free Christian counseling to abortion-vulnerable women.

The majority of women served through the pregnancy centers are underserved and do not have a network of support, which includes the lack of a church family. They consider abortion because they are oftentimes pressured by the father of the baby, their family or friends; or feel like they have no other choice. However, once moms are introduced to their baby via a free ultrasound, 93% will choose life.

The team at HCL provides individualized counseling and each mom is invited to free Curriculum of Life classes provided through the Maternal Assistance Program. One of HCL's clients who had been struggling and received a devotional and a Bible said: "Nobody has ever been so nice to me," and "the Bible means so much to me. I started to read it and I know that God put you into my life and I am so grateful."

The Bible Brigade mission goes hand-in-hand with services provided by Lutheran Disaster Care (LDC).

LDC has teams that travel all over the United States, helping victims of disasters. They also train volunteers around the state to serve on the teams, including using a chainsaw. In the training sessions, LDC emphasizes the importance of listening to the victims and how to appropriately share the hope that we have in Christ. Sharing the love and mercy of Christ through personal witness and the use of devotional materials through the Bible Brigade is a vital, integral part of the Lutheran disaster response.

Most recently, the Bible Brigade was present in Maui after the devastating fires. Bibles and gift cards were presented to two soldiers who lost everything. This put a smile on their face and hope in their hearts. Bible Brigade thanks the ladies of the LWML Texas District for their partnership and support of this ministry!
