Easter sneaks in



Easter sneaks into March on the final day of the month. March could very well be a dark and difficult month with the bulk of it devoted to Jesus' final agonizing steps to the cross. But Easter sneaks in. And the day of Resurrection changes everything.

That is true for our lives. Sometimes we start to believe that all we have is bad news — tragedy, war, disasters, violence, family break-ups, relationship distress, grief and chaos. Life can look so dark and depressing. The pain is real, the difficulties are distressing and sin is a formidable force. But by God's grace, Easter sneaks in.

Romans 6 details the surprising Good News: "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life." (vs. 3-4)

Surprise! The resurrection of Jesus buries the dismal darkness of sin and, through the gift of Baptism, you are raised to new life. Yes, Easter sneaks into your life through God's gifts and faithfulness.

Sometimes this assurance is needed for the church. Pundits and statisticians will tell you that the church is on its way out: they claim it is aging, dying, and out of style. Even your own observation may try to convince you that young people don't want to follow Jesus and that local congregations will not be able to survive. But, even into a bleak looking church environment in the western world, Easter sneaks in. Consider Paul's resurrection encouragement in 1 Corinthians 15: "The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain." (1 Corinthians 15:56-58)

Surprise! Your labor in the Lord is not in vain. The work of the church is not wasted effort. It brings the greatest blessing possible to the world! Founded on the resurrection of Jesus, the Word will never return empty (Isaiah 55:10-11). Share, tell, and show the love of Jesus! Easter will always sneak in.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, the world does not need another dose of pessimism or doubt. This chaotic and hope-starved globe is not craving another group of naysayers or grouches. The world needs Easter to sneak in through you—as you show Jesus' resurrection love, as you help the hurting with His forgiveness and comfort, as you bring His Word to empty hearts and souls, and as you plant the church in new places and among new people. The world needs Easter to sneak in!

Building bridges

Collaborative mission in west Texas

The church has been called to be a light and bring hope wherever God has positioned her, be it in the countryside or the city. As part of our mission to **"Go and make disciples of all nations**," there is also a call to love our neighbors as ourselves. That is what we aim to achieve in our communities, working together to advance and expand the Kingdom of God.

We have many opportunities for missions in West Texas. However, to reach these people, building bridges with other significant entities in the community is necessary. To achieve this, it is essential to go out and connect with the people around us.

And that is precisely what a group of disciples has been doing in some places in west Texas, in collaboration with local congregations such as Hope, Lubbock; Prince of Peace, Amarillo; and St. Paul, Canyon; and certified evangelists Beth Lauterbach and David Baldner. It's wonderful to see both American and Hispanic pastors working in unity to impact the community with the powerful message of the Gospel. Thanks to God, we have been able to celebrate four community events in the city of Hereford in partnership with the Blue Waters Apartments.

I vividly recall celebrating the first community event last summer: vacation Bible school. We wanted more families and children to know about this event, so a group of Hispanic missionaries, including Jaime Gonzalez, Arturo Gracía and Jaime Durkin, hit the streets of the town, visiting different locations to invite anyone we found. When trying to put flyers on the bulletin board outside the office of an apartment complex, the manager came out to ask what we were doing. After explaining about the VBS and our desire to invite the community, she invited us to go inside and invite the families living there.

This is how the conversations started. Relationships were established, leading to the August

> back-to-school event with over 125 backpacks filled with school supplies. We also celebrated the fall festival with games, candies and more. The Lutheran Literacy Project was another success as many children received Lutheran books and reading material, thanks to Margaret Peterson's work on this project. In December, we were blessed to celebrate the first Christmas service, attended by several families from the community.

> The Holy Spirit motivates us to continue, knowing that many people need to know God's love and forgiveness. This is

evident in the words of a child who participated in the VBS last summer. After numerous Bible lessons from the young people of Hope Lutheran Church, he boldly asked, **"Who is this Jesus you are talking about?"**

To answer these kinds of questions, we move forward with God's help, building bridges so that the Gospel can reach every corner of west Texas.

Crown of Life's 40th Anniversary

Where do we begin? That's easy — on Sunday, Jan. 15, 1984. That's when the official charter of Crown of Life Evangelical Lutheran Church was signed in the temporary location on Blanco Road, marking the beginning of a new LCMS congregation on the north side of San Antonio.

But the 40 years since were celebrated over the weekend of Jan. 13–14. It was a rice occasion! It was a wonderful occasion! It was a greatly enjoyed occasion! It will be a long-remembered occasion! And our 40th Anniversary Challenge Coin was a perfect remembrance appropriate in our military city, declaring our theme Scripture: "Let us hold fast the confession of our hope" (Hebrews 10:23).

On Saturday afternoon and evening, our Community Life Center (CLC) was filled with greetings and hugs, with laughter and smiles, and with stories spoken and enjoyed. Our CLC was decorated with an interesting and informative timeline of Crown of Life's first 40 years.

We were joined by 11 of the original, charter-signing members, who read us psalms when they were introduced. We were also joined by Rev, Paul and Jeanne Short (among those charter members) and heard from Pastor Short the story and various stories of our congregation's beginnings. In addition, longtime Crown of Life member Darlene Dague told us about the Classen-Steubing ranch (her family's ranch since the 1880s), upon which the Stone Oak development and Crown of Life were built. Also joining us were previous Crown of Life members from nearby and across Texas and far away (including New York, Florida, Missouri, Indiana, Arkansa and Ohio). We were joined by former DCE Tommy Moll and his wife, Laura, and by three of Senior Pastor Rev. Mark Barz's four children, who were all confirmed in the Lutheran faith here at Crown of Life. In addition, several present and former members were with us as musicians: Reilly Murphy (violin), Rev. Ken Bunge (trumpet) and Samantha Levenhagen (harp).

In our Evening Prayer worship on Saturday, our guest preacher was Rev. Jason Kaspar, pastor of Mount Calvary, LaGrange. He is the most recent Crown of Life member to attend seminary. On Sunday morning, the guest preacher in our two Divine Services was Rev. Dr. David Maxwell, the first of eight Crown of Life members attending seminary with prayers and financial support to become an LCMS pastor. Maxwell currently serves as the Louis A. Fincke and Anna B. Shine Professor of Systematic Theology at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

Finally, we were joined by Becca Jones, executive director of our Texas District Church Extension Fund, to help us give thanks for debt freedom after full repayment of our \$1.7 million loan on our Community Life Center. (Although many had a few moments of concern when we learned from Becca that we were – can you believe it? – \$40 short on the final payment.) Thankfully, a number of children and youth and a few adults came forward with the necessary dollar bills!

For all of these reasons and more, it was a time to sin "Praise God, from Whom all blessings flow!"

Fun fact: Did you know that Martin Luther King Jr. Day is the only federal holiday designated

by Congress to be a national day of service? According to an AmeriCorps survey, both Dallas and Houston made the top 12 metropolitan areas with the highest rates of formal and informal volunteering! Yay, Texas! (Information from Census.gov.)

Not so fun fact: Did you know that over 6,000 children die every day of hunger and hunger-related causes? (Statistic shared by Feed My Starving Children.)

With that in mind, Concordia's Service Learning and Campus Ministry departments collaborated to bring a food packing event to our campus on MLK Day. Sixty-five students and staff worked side-by-side to pack nutritious meals made of rice, soy, vitamins and dehydrated vegetables. It was a fun, community building experience that provided 20,000 meals that will be shipped to schools and orphanages across Haiti.

Completing the project and getting the meals to their destination involves hiring a transport company to pick up the pallets of food and equipment. Two trucks were scheduled to arrive at CTX. Upon arrival, they were instructed to call me so I could auide them to the exact location where they could load the pallets. They followed the instructions correctly, but their calls did not come through on my cell phone, and they had no clue where to go. So, Mhari of Mission of Hope contacted me and asked me to try to call them. I'm not sure why, but when I tried to call them with my cell phone, their phones didn't even ring. Then I tried to call them on my office phone, and it went straight to their voicemail. Ugh! Communication consternation, chaos and confusion!

Our only hope was Mhari. She was the mediator between us. The transport drivers would relay messages to me through Mhari, and I would relay messages to them through Mhari. It was a rather complicated process, but eventually it was successful!

Oxford Dictionary describes a "mediator" as a person who attempts to make people involved in a conflict come to an agreement; a go-between. That, my friends, reminds me of Jesus! **"For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:5).**

Intercessor is a synonym of mediator. Oxford Dictionary describes an "intercessor" as a person who intervenes on behalf of another, especially by prayer. The Holy Spirit does that for us!

"Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words" (Rom. 8:26).

One of life's rites of passage is getting your first apartment—a place to call your own. At Upbring, we want the apartments we provide the youth in our BeREAL Supervised Independent Living (SIL) program to feel like home, and we have two exceptional volunteers who since 2017 have been making that happen.

As of January 2024, Susan Jensen and Bob Daemmrich and their team of helpers from a local Lutheran church have furnished 90 student apartments in Austin and San Marcos with nearly 1,200 furniture and accessory items. This generous effort is an extension of a church initiative which collects donated furniture.

"Bob and Susan are absolutely amazing," boasts Lanisha Bell, BeREAL Program Director. "They are truly our BeREAL angels and are the real Most Valuable Players (MVPs)."

After Lanisha contacts Susan about an apartment vacancy and when a student arrives, Bob and Susan select appropriate furniture stored in their church basement, and then their team delivers it using Bob's pickup and 14-foot trailer.

He redeemed us as sinners on the cross and pleads for us before the Father. We also believe that God sent His Son, Jesus Christ, to live the perfect life He requires and to become our substitute.

We are reminded in scripture that "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:33). Christ took our sin upon Himself and died on the cross, on our behalf. When we believe in Jesus Christ as our Savior, He bears our sins and gives us His forgiveness.

The path to victory is sure, but it leads through the land of suffering. Jesus is saying "it is right to call me Messiah; it is also right to call me the Son of Man, and the Son of Man must suffer." Jesus indicated this plainly. Jesus' suffering and death on the cross was not an option; it was not an accident. It was necessary so we have a path to salvation. The cross was the plan for victory for all that believe in him. According to the prophet Isaiah, the coming Messiah's suffering would bring peace and healing. Jesus suffered on the cross to save people from the consequences of sin. As the apostle Peter wrote: "He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree" (1 Peter 2:24). Jesus died on the cross to absorb all the wrath that we had built up. He paid our debt.

During the season of Lent, we should position ourselves in prayer and repentance through daily devotions and the reading of Scripture. Two Bible studies have been carefully written to acquaint ourselves with the story of the cross and to remind us how important that event was for all of us.

The first is titled "Lamb of God." This series of Daily Devotions is offered by Lutheran Hour Ministries at **Ihm. org/dailydevotions**. The devotions will help strengthen and encourage your faith as you do the same for others. Have them delivered right to your inbox or listen to audio podcasts — access them on your mobile device through the free app, or listen with Spotify, iHeart Radio, Alexa, or Google Home.

Seasonal devotions for Advent and Lent are available in English and Spanish. Perfect for personal reflection or to share with family, friends and congregations, these seasonal meditations will help prepare you to celebrate the true meaning of these seasons.

The second is "Be Gracious to Me" from Concordia Publishing House: cph.org. This series of Bible stories over 47 daily devotions repeatedly build on Psalm 41 and support Scripture passages that together paint a picture of how David's words are now your reality through Christ and your Baptism. These devotions, starting with Ash Wednesday and concluding on Easter Sunday, are meant to be used with the "Be Gracious to Me" Lenten preaching and worship series. They are also available in English and Spanish and online.

Please seek out these studies to enhance your Lenten comfort and understanding.
