What does it mean to be Lutheran?

Part III (For the first two installments, please see the August and September issues.)

Over the past two months, we've been asking what it means to be Lutheran, taking a look at Hermann Sasse's book, *Here We Stand*. His third question asks if Lutheranism is focused on the veneration of Martin Luther and a celebration of European/German ethnic heritage.

Sasse's answer was an emphatic "No." In fact, Sasse added, "It is only when the Evangelical Lutheran Church is in a manifest state of decline that such an extravagant veneration of Luther asserts itself." (34)

Sasse understood that Lutheran identity meant Gospel identity — a tenacious and bold declaration of Scripture alone, faith alone and grace alone. Even as the Lutheran church in Germany was under pressure in 1938 to veer from its Gospel focus, Sasse proclaimed, "Here we stand" — not on morality, not on traditions, not on human opinions, not on Luther and not on German ethnicity, but only on the free gift of the forgiveness of sins for Christ's sake through faith.

Sasse noted that in the Reformation era, "men did not have the slightest interest in *Luther's teachings* as such; their whole interest was in *the teaching of the Gospel.* Luther's teaching was not accepted because it came from him, but because it agreed with the Gospel." (79)

And what about a Germanic/European ethos? Sasse — a German by birth — spoke humbly about the true nature of the Lutheran church: "The Lutheran Reformation was not trying to establish a German Christianity; it was not interested in a German church...it was interested in the one, the true, the only church of Christ." "Never and

nowhere does the Lutheran Church inquire after what is German, but it inquires after what is true—the saving truth of God for all." (58)

That is our Lutheran identity. Our goal is not to laud Martin Luther or to preserve western customs. The unique beauty of Lutheranism is that it transcends human debates and desires, lifting high the cross of Jesus Christ to the world.

Sasse noted, "[The Lutheran Reformation] had a very real appreciation for the fact that prominent characteristics of each nation express themselves in the life of the church all the way from outward forms to inner piety." (58)

Today in Texas we rejoice in African, Asian, Latino, European and American outward forms and inner piety in our LCMS family. This is not a risk to Lutheran identity; it is the expression of true Lutheran identity. As Sasse emphasized, "There is only one Gospel for all nations, just as there is only one Christ for all men." (59)

In this Reformation month, it is important to remember that our identity in Christ is what Lutherans stand upon. Scripture alone, faith alone, grace alone, Christ alone. This is what the world needs to hear from us and see in us. This love, this self-sacrifice, this attentiveness to how the Gospel meets our generation — this is where we stand.

"Those who had been scattered preached the word wherever they went." (Acts 8:4 NIV)

We see here the aftermath of Stephen's martyrdom. Stephen, one of the early deacons in the church, faced death by stoning because of his fearless witness for Jesus. This tragedy sparked intense persecution against the church in Jerusalem, forcing many believers to scatter to the regions of Judea and Samaria while the apostles remained in Jerusalem.

What's amazing is how these early Christians responded to the persecution. Instead of being silenced, these lay people saw it as an opportu-

nity to spread their faith. They preached the Word wherever they went, and it was a crucial turning point in the expansion of the Christian church.

These lay Christians became missionaries in their new locations, spreading the message of Jesus wherever they went. And their example of preaching "wherever they went" is a powerful reminder for us today.

God is also calling you and I to preach the Word wherever

we go, bringing Jesus to our neighborhoods, workplaces, schools and even our homes. To talk about Jesus in everyday conversations and through our actions. To be a witness for Christ wherever we go.

In response to this call, an LCMS Task Force has emphasized the need for renewed dedication to lay training and the role of evangelists within our church. The Texas District is embracing this call, working to equip baptized believers to preach the Word wherever we go.

The 2013 Resolution 4-06A Task Force Report made two key recommendations:

Recommendation 7: District lay training programs are to be commended with thanksgiving for the many willing lay servants who seek further theological education and desire to serve in various capacities in their congregations. The task force recommends that a major emphasis in lay training programs be placed on the role of evangelist and the task of outreach in the increasingly diverse and challenging world of the U.S.

Recommendation 8: In conjunction with recommendation 7, the task force recommends that congregations and districts be encouraged to identify individuals for special training in and attention to evangelism. As individuals are identified, we encourage congregations and districts to facilitate their training both through existing Synod efforts and programs and in special,

intensive training through district lay programs.

In the Texas District, we have made available a district-wide lay training program called Evangelist Training for the many willing lay servants who seek further theological education and desire to serve in various capacities, preaching the Word wherever we go, with an emphasis "on the role of evangelist and the task of outreach in the increasingly diverse and challenging world of the U.S."

We are in the process of identifying individuals for this special training. Is God calling **you** to be an evangelist, to share Jesus wherever you go?



This past July, the spirit of St. Nicholas, popularly known as Santa Claus, brought Christmas cheer to girls at Upbring New Life Children's Center (New Life) through our annual Christmas in July event. History tells us that St. Nicholas was the patron saint of children, protecting them from abuse and exploitation. His presence each summer is a heartwarming reminder of hope for the children we serve at this residential treatment center.

Keeping with tradition, our Upbring staff ensured the girls had everything they needed to create artworks and participate in activities like races.

In the New Life Chapel, the girls made colorful flipflop sandals, while over in the Café, girls had a blast making Grinch slime. In the Games Room, girls sat in a circle wearing oven mitts, trying to unwrap a large ball of plastic wrap filled with hidden prizes including fidget toys, stickers, Croc charms and Chapstick.

One of the most exciting activities was the Christmas sleigh race. Pairs of girls raced "sleighs" made from cutout paper taped to red balloons, which were attached to straws threaded on a long string. To start their engines, the girls blew up their balloons and then let them go, with the sleighs that went the farthest the fastest winning the race.

A Frosty the Snowman Relay added to the healthy competition. Finally, the girls

enjoyed a snowball fight with sno-cone-style shaved ice formed into lightweight balls providing a perfect end to a magical day.





Martin Luther – our legacy

As we venture into the fall season and experience the changing weather and colors, we are reminded of the activities that occur during the month. In October, we recognize Columbus Day, United Nations Day and Halloween. One special day to also include is Reformation Day on Oct. 31.


Reformation Day is often forgotten. LCMS congregations may hold special services on Oct. 31 and/or on the preceding or following Sunday.

To refresh our understanding, Martin Luther is the "great reformer" who re-focused the church on a Christ-centered fellowship of believers who hold true to traditions of grace alone, faith alone and Scripture alone. To this day, we hail the words "Here I Stand" as spoken by Luther over 500 years ago. Martin Luther is the legacy of the Lutheran church.

Lutheranism had its beginnings in 1517, when Luther publicly called for the correction of errors in the church. Luther was a pastor, professor, author, composer of hymns — and a reformer. His ideas still stimulate new thinking in the church. He is respected — but not worshiped. Today there are over 8 million Lutherans in the United States.

The Protestant Reformation began in Wittenberg, Germany, when Luther published a document he titled "Disputation on the Power of Indulgences," or as they are commonly known now, the 95 Theses. The document was a series of ideas about Christianity in which he invited people to debate. The focus was a disagreement over whether Christians attain salvation in heaven through faith in God alone, or through a combination of faith and good works. He believed that individuals are saved only by faith in Jesus Christ and the grace of God.

He thought the Catholic church's practices, including the focus on works (such as pilgrimages, the sale of indulgences to obtain forgiveness, and prayers addressed to saints) were immoral. Unlike Catholics, Lutherans do not believe it is proper or scriptural to offer prayers to saints or to view Mary as in any sense a mediator between God and human beings. Lutherans believe that the mother of Jesus was a common person blessed by God to give birth to the Savior, Jesus Christ, who is truly the Son of God.



Luther's questioning led to his excommunication and the start of the Protestant Reformation. Additionally, the invention of the printing press around 1448 had a significant impact on the spread of information, and the technology enabled the text of the 95 Theses to quickly travel across Europe, which played a vital role in the success of the Reformation. The printing press also was used to print Bibles in German, giving the people their first exposure to Scripture.

Luther also believed that forgiveness for sins came entirely from God. In contrast, Roman Catholic teachings held that forgiveness came from God and as a result of our works. The Gospel is revered as the true teachings of Christ, is offered to everyone, and will save those who believe in its promises.

OUR PRAYER: Dear Lord, for the reformers of the past, we give thanks. Grant that we, in our own age, may stand fast to Scripture and the Savior, whose life was given so we might have forgiveness and eternal life.

In Jesus's name. Amen.
