The joy of salvation

Are you encountering any holiday drudgery? Is any Christmas sadness stealing your joy? The Scriptures bring clarity about the Advent and Christmas season: It is a time for joy. The angels declared that the arrival of the Christ-child brought "good tidings of great joy" to all people.

True, the world is a challenging place. Yes, we bear the cross as followers of Christ. By all means, in this world we will have trouble. But Christ has overcome the world. And now, we rejoice in the Lord always. If we forget, the apostle Paul added, "Again I will say, rejoice!" (Philippians 4:4).

The Confessions emphasize the joy of salvation in Jesus. Quoting Martin Luther, the Formula of Concord notes:

"Faith is a divine work in us that transforms us and begets us anew from God, kills the Old Adam, makes us entirely different people in heart, spirit, mind, and all our powers, and brings the Holy Spirit with it. Oh, faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing, so that it is impossible for it not to be constantly doing what is good... Faith is a vital, deliberate trust in God's grace, so certain that it would die a thousand times for it. And such confidence and knowledge of divine grace makes us joyous, mettlesome. and merry toward God and all creatures. This the Holy Spirit works by faith, and therefore without any coercion a man is willing and desirous to do good to everyone, to serve everyone, to suffer everything for the love of God and to his glory, who has been gracious to him." (FC, SD IV, 10ff, emphasis added)

Not long ago, an author pointed out that people in our generation may be walking away from the church not because they are rejecting what the church teaches, but because the people of the church appear not to believe what the church teaches. The "joyous, mettlesome and merry" attitude toward God and all creatures seems absent. The desire to "do good to everyone, to serve everyone, and to suffer everything for the love of God" appears to be lacking.

But Christmas is a time when God restores to us the joy of salvation (Psalm 51).

A few months ago, a 70-year-old man got lost in a western national park. Rescue teams sprang into action. Helicopters combed the area where he was last seen. The search effort was massive. Nobody became disgusted that the man got lost. No one refused to search for him because he had erred. No one pointed fingers or picked a fight with him for being so careless and wrong. Instead, no resource was spared in the effort to find him. And the joy that erupted when he was found made headlines across the nation.

Christmas is God's rescue mission. Let us join in the angelic joy of the Savior who came to find us.

About 35 people gathered at St. Timothy, Houston, on Oct. 2 for the first Exponential Learning Community Summit. The Summit

was designed for those who have been, are or soon will be participants in Exponential Learning Communities sponsored by the Texas District.

The Exponential Learning Communities process is designed to help professional church workers and lay leaders multiply disciples and congregations in their ministry contexts. The impetus for the gathering came from participants themselves. Focus groups conducted by district staff indicated that past participants felt a strong need to gather for the purpose of sharing best practices, mutual accountability and encouragement to one another.

Many of you know my dear wife, Terry. On Jan. 29 of next year, which is right around the corner, we will celebrate our 59th wedding anniversary. That's a long time with the same man!

Since our wedding and even before, I've discovered that Terry loves to give. She often remarks that she'd like to win the lottery just so she could give the proceeds away to people in need.

That love of giving, which both of us share, prompted us a few years ago to establish an endowment to support organizations that provide charitable relief for people, especially children, suffering from hunger, disability, abuse, homelessness or any other chronic malady.

The endowment's name, The Least of These, is based on a story told by Jesus in Matthew 25. He was meeting privately with His disciples, answering their questions about the end of the world.

Jesus said that on the day of judgment, He will bless the people who fed Him when He was hungry, gave Him a drink when He was thirsty, clothed Him when He was naked, provided hospitality to Him when He was a stranger and visited Him when He was sick and imprisoned.

When the disciples asked Jesus when they had seen Him hungry, thirsty, naked, a stranger, sick, or imprisoned, He replied, "I tell you the truth. When you did these things for the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it for me."

Since The Least of These was established, we've made more gifts to the endowment. At an unknown point in the future, our estate plan calls for an additional infusion of our assets to this endowment. It's our way of expressing our love for Jesus and for people in need.

Some of you have also heard that the Legacy Deo Board of Directors has established an endowment in thanksgiving to God for the 55th anniversary of my ordination to the pastoral ministry, which will occur on June 7, 2025. That endowment is named **The Great Sending**.

It's based on the words of Jesus in John 20:21 — "As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you" — and will annually support, in perpetuity, the work of Christian missions in Texas, across our land and around the world. It will also receive support some day from our estate.

What's the point of these stories? Simply this. Christmas is a time for giving. As we give gifts to the people we know and love, we also have opportunity in many ways to give for the sake of those we don't know. Though we don't know them, we can still show our love for them.

Our little chiweenie Regalito has separation anxiety. We dropped him off at our friend Betty's house

while we helped a family move. Betty said that as soon as we left her house, Regalito was agitated and began to yelp and whine, refusing to be consoled for at least half an hour. Even though Regalito knows and loves Betty — she dog sits for us when we are out of town — he was anxious about where his owners went.

Research.com reports that six out of 10 college students experience "overwhelming anxiety" while over 40% were saddled with crippling depression.

What causes you anxiety? Safety concerns, family issues, relationship strife, lack of finances, poor health, political unrest, wars, fears about climate change, addiction? There is a plethora of things that can catapult each of us into a downward spiral of anxiety and fear.

The Glorify app recently had a fascinating quote from Chuck Swindoll: "We are all faced with a series of great opportunities brilliantly disguised as impossible situations." When you reframe anxiety in that light, it is an opportunity to trust God in all things, to depend on Him as your source of strength and stamina!

Here is a little anti-anxiety encouragement from God's Word. Run to it often!

For nothing will be impossible with God. Luke 1:37

Jeremiah 32:17



'A Proud Moment'

Nico's Story at **Upbring Head Start**

When Nico* entered the Upbring Early Head Start Preschool program in Bay City, Texas, as an infant, he was already showing signs of developmental delays. He wasn't progressing toward walking at the same rate as his peers, so the education team provided early intervention services to help him gain lower body strength.

At age 3, Nico transitioned to the Head Start program. (Early Head Start enrolls children from low-income families up to age 2, while Head Start is open to those ages 3 to 5.) Teachers noticed his verbal skills were also delayed—he would babble and sometimes point but he wasn't talking. To help with this, Head Start added speech therapy to his individual learning plan.

With these interventions, plus daily classroom support from his Head Start teachers, Nico began to flourish. He went from not walking to walking, from nonverbal to verbal. He started saying more words and expressing himself appropriately to his teachers, his peers and his family.

"In Nico's last year of Head Start, he was finally able to say his teacher's name," recalled Education Coordinator Emma Allen. "This was a proud moment."

Nico's father and siblings reaped the benefits of Head Start too. Each Head Start family is connected with an Upbring Family Engagement Advocate who provides them with wraparound support to meet their full range of needs. At the time, Nico's father was raising three young sons on his own. He worked hard to provide for them but still needed support. Upbring Head Start helped Nico's dad find resources to get through the hardships he was facing—something he truly appreciated.



Thanks to the care he received from Upbring, Nico was ready to start kindergarten on time alongside his peers. Today, he is a happy third grader. He's doing well in school, and his father credits Upbring Head Start for making that possible.

Nico's amazing progress illustrates how highquality early childhood education builds a solid foundation for child wellbeing and lifelong learning. "As a professional in early childhood, I know that Head Start is powerful and that it works," Emma shared. "Our programs make a big impact, and for some families, it is truly life-changing."

Spiritual Care for Girls at New Life Children's Center

New Life is the most appropriate name to describe both the facility and the spiritual care program at Upbring's New Life Children's Center. New Life provides a place for girls ages 11–17 to heal from significant trauma caused by abuse or neglect.

The healing gives girls a chance to:

- ▶ Recover from abuse;
- ► Learn skills to manage their responses to trauma;
- ▶ Provide individualized and specialized education to get back on track with their education; and

► Leave with a chance to build a new life.

New Life Children's Center is Texas' only facility able to accept girls into an intensive psychiatric treatment program, meaning that New Life is the essential stopgap for girls with significant trauma whose next step is either being psychiatrically hospitalized or put into juvenile detention.

During their average stay of nine months, girls are given the option to explore their faith in a safe, structured environment, which is a key component in the holistic healing every girl at New Life deserves. The spiritual care program is a unique, principal component of New Life's services. The program is led by Mark Lara, who provides space for girls to experience a faith journey built on experiencing God in many ways. This may include Bible studies, participating in local youth groups, vacation Bible schools, journaling, gardening or even church camps.

The LWML Texas District mission grant of \$20,000 will provide funding to pay ministry expenses; and purchase Bibles and Bible studies as well as gardening and art therapy materials.
