The first sermon of Jesus

What were Jesus' first words to a waiting and wounded world? He said, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel" (Mark 1:15).

That's our message, too. It is a crucial revelation for every broken life. In the middle of bad news, meaningless news, confusing news and distracting news, there is Good News. Not only does it exist, but the Creator of the universe came down to turn you toward it, bless you with it and call you to share it.

Sometimes we get confused about that. We become convinced that people need to get their acts together first. If they had faith like us or virtue like us or lives like ours, they may have a chance. But that's not what God's Word reveals.

God makes very clear that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). And, when it comes to the Gospel, the Good News of being absolved of our sin, it has nothing to do with our worthiness or merit.

Lutheran theologian Francis Pieper noted in his **Christian Dogmatics**, "Absolution rests neither on self-aroused contrition nor on true contrition worked by the Holy Ghost through the Law; neither on confession of all sins before men nor on any sort of human satisfaction. Absolution is based solely on the fact of world reconciliation by the perfect satisfaction of Christ and on the divine command (John 20:21; Luke 24:47) in Christ's name to proclaim the remission of sins provided by Him. And this proclamation of forgiveness for Christ's sake, in no wise

affected by human worthiness or unworthiness, the hearers are to believe" (Vol. 3, 194).

He goes on: "Among all nations and in all climes not a single person can be found whom we would be deceiving if we not only assured him, but affirmed it with an oath in the name of God: 'Through Christ God is reconciled to you, does not impute your sins to you, but forgives them'" (Vol. 3, 195).

What if we decide to substitute our judgments and conditions in place of God's gift of repentance and Good News? Pieper answers, "That places the Christian religion in the one class with the pagan work religions" (Vol. 3, 199).

The breathtaking truth is this: "To create this faith, Christ wants both repentance and remission of sins proclaimed in His name (Luke 24:47). For that reason Scripture says that faith cometh by hearing (Rom. 10:17), and the Apology teaches with Scripture: "Faith is conceived and strengthened through absolution, through the hearing of the Gospel" (Trigl. 263, XII, 42) (Vol. 3, 201).

If we want a wounded world to live, we are called to trust and echo Jesus' generous first sermon.

"But those who drink the water I give will never be thirsty again. It becomes a fresh, bubbling spring within them, giving them eternal life." John 4:14

We see something incredible: Jesus goes out of His way to seek out a Samaritan woman at a well. She wasn't looking for Him, but He was looking for her. In the midst of her daily routine, Jesus meets her, fully aware of her past and her pain, and offers her something far greater than physical water: living water that leads to eternal life. This moment wasn't just about quenching physical thirst; it was about Jesus seeking her out, meeting her in her brokenness, and offering hope, forgiveness and new life.

Along with learning from and being inspired by the keynote speaker, the directors attend sessions such as "Implementing a Developmentally Appropriate Curriculum Environment" and "Establishing and Maintaining an Effective Organization."

The Texas District Early Childhood Council plays a vital role in planning and providing leadership opportunities throughout the year. In addition to the retreat, there are monthly Zoom meetings with special speakers, a conference in February with special sessions for leaders, and the Administrators' Conference in July. Leaders have wonderful opportunities to continue to grow in leadership as they serve the Lord.

I thank God for our Christ-centered directors who are using their God-given abilities to provide able leadership. I thank God for the faithful preschool teachers, and I also thank God for our pastors who proclaim the Gospel in our early childhood centers. Obstacle Course

During Christmas break, I decided to hike the longest trail in Texas, the Lone Star Hiking Trail. It provides 96 miles of walking

pleasure through the Sam Houston National Forest, extending from Richards to Cleveland.

At mile 71, my journey became a bit complicated. The San Jacinto River bridge was non-existent and I'm not a swimmer, so I had to use my phone's GPS to figure out a detour around this obstacle. Six miles later, I was ecstatic to be reunited with the trail.

The next day I had another opportunity to use my GPS. Due to downed trees, the Lone Star Hiking Trail is officially closed between trailheads 13 and 14. So, I dialed up a route and started down the highways and byways. My GPS led me to a dirt road, which was rather nice at first: no traffic to contend with, and beautiful wooded scenery! Then it started to become a challenge.

There were downed trees everywhere, and the path I was supposed to follow became invisible. I started climbing over and under trees, sometimes walking on downed trees as if they were a balance beam. I finally took off my backpack so that I could scramble over or under the trees without getting stuck on protruding limbs. The most concerning issue was being in the middle of the woods and having no clear path to follow.

I cried out to God for help and in my mind felt Him urging me to "trust the blue dot and keep moving forward!" Seeing as how I didn't have a lot of other options, I kept trying to line up my path with the blue dot of the GPS.

What seemed like hours later, I finally found a real road again! Thank you, Jesus!

Our lives are filled with obstacles too. How do we navigate the unplanned illnesses, job losses, relationship trials, financial insecurities or lack of direction for the future? What is the blue dot we need to follow?



I find encouragement in Isaiah 30:20-21: "And though the Lord give you the bread of adversity and the water of affliction, yet your Teacher will not hide himself anymore, but your eyes shall see your Teacher. And your ears shall hear a word behind you, saying, 'This is the way, walk in it,' when you turn to the right or when you turn to the left."

Jesus is the Way! He has given us His Word to guide us, and His Holy Spirit to empower us. Though it may be scary, you can trust Jesus (the blue dot) to guide you through the obstacle course called life.

\$3.9 million loan from the Texas District Church Extension Fund (Texas CEF). This milestone was the culmination of years of dedication, faith and the collective efforts of the church community.


The journey began in 2008 when Texas CEF approved a loan to construct the church's new sanctuary. Over the years, six capital campaigns — each lasting three years — fueled the steady progress toward debt repayment. Additionally, the church strategically leveraged annual loan rebate checks provided by Texas CEF's unique program, accumulating over \$300,000 in rebates. These rebates, made possible by the faithful investments of church members, played a crucial role in paying off the loan.

The significance of this accomplishment was celebrated with a heartfelt note-burning ceremony, symbolizing the end of the loan. However, the day held even more blessings. Faith Lutheran Church welcomed three new members into their family through the Sacrament of Baptism — one adult woman and two teenagers. These joyous moments highlighted the importance of having a space where faith can grow and lives can be transformed.

Faith's partnership with Texas CEF stands as a testament to the power of shared vision and investment. Each contribution, large or small, has played a part in building a sanctuary where God's work continues to flourish. This achievement reminds us that our investments can create lasting legacies, impacting lives for generations to come. Your investments make a difference.

Gentrys and Upbring Bring

Healing & Joy

to Foster Siblings

Kids do best when they have a close bond with at least one parent who takes care of their needs and gives them a safe, loving home. Sadly, this wasn't the case for siblings Bella, 4, and Madeline, 3, who suffered physical abuse and were exposed to domestic violence at home. But life for these little girls was about to change for the better when Lauren and Pierce Gentry of Fort Worth, decided to become foster parents.

The Gentrys knew they wanted to foster even before having their own children, Isaiah, 3, and Lanie, 1. Their desire sprang from a church sermon that highlighted the need for foster families in their community. "We got home from church, and both said, 'Yes, we should definitely do that," Lauren recalled. Also, when Pierce was in high school, "I had a close friend who was in foster care move in with us and I saw the impact a caring family could have on someone," he said.

The Gentry's plans to foster were delayed, however, when Pierce's job necessitated a two-year move to California, where the couple wouldn't have a strong support system.

When they returned to Texas in 2024, the Gentrys revisited their dream and became licensed foster parents through Upbring Foster In Texas (FIT). Lauren praised FIT Area Director Toni Peters for answering "tons of questions" and rearranging trainings when there were scheduling conflicts. "And when she came to our house to do our walkthroughs and inspections, she was so sweet."

When Bella and Madeline arrived that December, the scene was both exciting and chaotic. "Our two kids and the siblings were running around and screaming and playing with toys and jumping," said Lauren. "It was very sweet and Bella and Madeline were just excited to be here."

The Gentrys are committed to supporting the sibling's birth family, hoping the girls will be safely reunited with their parents or a relative. They haven't ruled out adoption if it's ultimately best for the girls.

Lauren says that while fostering can be difficult when younger biological children are involved, she and Pierce have faith that the empathy, compassion and love they've shown the siblings will positively impact Isaiah and Lanie.

"We talk to our children about how God calls us to love others, and fostering is a way to live out that purpose," she said.

The Gentrys' story is a reminder that children can find safety, care and hope through foster care.

The LWML Texas District was hard at work the first two weeks of November, organizing Lutheran World Relief (LWR) ingathering collection sites in Marion (near San Antonio), Houston and Plano. With the donations from all over the state, four semi-trucks were filled with quilts and kits and were delivered to LWR warehouses for distribution around the world.

Our prayer is that these donations will bring hope and care to those suffering from homelessness and despair caused by natural disasters and war.

Collected were 15,307 quilts and blankets, 9,360 school kits, 10,468 personal-care kits, 1,593 baby-care kits and 470 fabric kits.

Orphan Grain Train Houston Branch: Building Hope

The Orphan Grain Train (OGT) Houston Branch had an exciting 2024. Construction began on the Servant Center warehouse in Pasadena and was slated to be completed in February. Dedication is scheduled for March 23. The new building will allow expansion of the mission with capacity to sort, pack and distribute more resources to those in need.

The Houston Branch was amazed to see the outpouring of support in 2024. With the financial and physical donations received, the Houston Branch was able to expand their out-

reach by providing support to two emergency foster shelters, multiple homeless outreach organizations, a veteran's transition center and a battered women's shelter along with other missions in the area.

OGT Houston Branch felt called to send support to the victims of Hurricane Helene. God answered the call by filling two 26-foot box trucks with donations, which were delivered in October and November.
