

Common convictions

Lutheran Christians in the Texas District share strong, common convictions about the truth of God's Word and the truths in God's Word.

In my column last month, I included a portion of the brief

address that I gave to the Texas District convention shortly after being elected, which emphasized our common convictions, our common cause and our common and vital community. In this brief communication, I want to converse with you a bit about our common convictions.

Nowhere in Scripture is doctrine "ish." It's not, "Well, close enough is close enough." In fact, quite the opposite. St. Paul writes to Timothy:

Keep a close watch on yourself and on the teaching. Persist in this... 1 TIM. 4:16

The NIV uses "doctrine" instead of "teaching" used by the ESV here. We should work hard to understand the truths contained in God's Word and get it right (while also remembering that we are fallible human beings, of course!).

And when we get it right, we come to realize just how wonderful and powerful the teaching of God's

Word is! Take the doctrine of justification by grace through faith — the central teaching of Scripture. St. Paul, again:

For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus. **ROM. 3:23-24**

Forgiveness of sins and the eternal life with God that it brings is a gift — it's free! We don't have to earn it; we don't have to deserve it; and now that we have it, we don't have to prove it! Not to God. The proof lies in the cross of Jesus. It's free for us because it cost Jesus his very life. The unmitigated Gospel is the best news in the world! Who wouldn't want to get that right?

Or how about the doctrine of Holy Baptism?

Baptism ... now saves you. 1 PETER 3:21

It's not just a little bit of water and a nice feeling, but a Means of Grace by which the Holy Spirit effects saving faith and the forgiveness of sins. Something miraculous happens every time someone is baptized. What a marvelous blessing. Again, who wouldn't want to get that right?

What other important teachings from God's Word are now coming to your mind?

It's probably obvious, but sometimes things that go without saying still need to be said. These doctrines are not just intellectual formations that we need to get right. They have real implications for real people. They have wonderful implications for those of us who are believers. The grace of God is magnificent!

The teachings of God's Word also have implications for those who are far from God. We believe that the only way to eternal life is through Jesus. That conviction should motivate us to our common cause. Or to continue the words of St. Paul in 1 Tim. 4:16:

...for by so doing you will save both yourself and your hearers.

The purpose of our strong convictions is not simply the maintenance of pure doctrine. It is the salvation of those who hear it. More on that to come...





..

... Success for me is following Jesus every day.



How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings good news, who publishes peace, who brings good news of happiness, who publishes salvation, who says to

Zion, "Your God reigns." Isaiah 52:7

The Texas District gives thanks to God for the evangelists who bring the Good News of Jesus to people who may not yet feel comfortable walking through church doors. Since 2017, over 230 everyday Christians have been trained and sent as evangelists to engage the disconnected, build relationships and invite people to hear the saving Gospel. These are the brave women and men of God who bring Good News, who publish peace, who bring good news of happiness, who publish salvation, who say to Zion, "Your God reigns."

They are members of congregations who respond to the voice of the Holy Spirit inviting them to reach those who are far from God. Under the care and support of their pastors, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, they bring the Gospel into neighborhoods, workplaces, parks and homes — places where Jesus meets people through meaningful relationships and personal conversations.

The goal is simple: that more people might come to know Jesus and be connected to His body, the church. This is the heartbeat of the Great Commission:

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations... teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always." MATT. 28:19–20

Jesus uses evangelists to build bridges to the body of Christ. Many people today are searching for spiritual truth, but don't yet know where to find it. Jesus uses evangelists to help them take that first step by listening, loving and sharing the hope they have in Him. Their role is to prepare the way so that those

who are disconnected or hurting might encounter Christ and be welcomed into a church where they can be nurtured through Word and Sacrament.

At the 2025 district convention, the Texas District joyfully adopted Resolution 01-01-25 to celebrate and continue this work. In 2024 alone, 54 evangelists completed their training, and more than 80 are currently being equipped. This ministry answers the prayer of the church: "Lord, send workers into Your harvest."

And so, with joy and gratitude, the Texas District resolved to:

Fifty-five years!

On Sept. 7, exactly 65 years after Lutheran Foundation of Texas (LFOT) was formed, I will retire after 55 years of public ministry in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Nearly 14 of those years

of service have been joyfully devoted to LFOT/ Legacy Deo.

The past 55 years have been a whirlwind! My career in church work began as a fourth-grade teacher at St. Paul Lutheran School, Austin. Fresh out of Texas A&M with a degree in animal science (a long story), having no idea how to teach, earning \$200 a month, I had a great year with 30 fourth graders.

That's where Terry and I met. She was not a fourth grader. Her little brother was. Dating, engagement and one grad school semester at A&M preceded our marriage on Jan. 29, 1966, also my 23rd birthday. After another fourth-grade semester at Pilgrim Lutheran School, Houston, with Terry at my side, we were off to the seminary.

Here are the places and ministries Terry and I have served during our almost 60 years together:

- Concordia Theological Seminary, Springfield, III. (1966-1970), including two years of field work at Trinity Lutheran Church, Nokomis, III., and the third year on vicarage at Ascension, Charlotte, N.C.
- Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Biloxi, Miss. (pastor, 1970-73).
- Pastor of Redeemer, Beaumont (1973-1981), including the planting of Hope, Winnie.
- Georgetown (1981-1986) as a mission planter, which is now 1,000 member Faith Lutheran Church.
- Lutheran Foundation of Texas (1986-1991), as development director/executive director.
- Texas District president (1991-2001), serving

through the end of the first year of the fourth and final three-year term.

- LCMS president (2001-2010), serving three terms.
- Concordia University Texas (2011-2015) as presidential ambassador.
- Lutheran Foundation of Texas/Legacy Deo (2016-2025) as legacy giving ambassador/chief executive officer.

Throughout those years, Terry has survived 18 moves, initially as stay-at-home mother, then fine jewelry store manager, and subsequently traveling extensively with and without her husband. She supported and encouraged the wives of pastors, district presidents and international leaders, extending hospitality to literally thousands of dinner guests in our homes in Texas and St. Louis.

The past 55 years have been blessed by the grace of God and the love, acceptance, patience, forgiveness and support of my dear wife, Terry; our daughter, Angie; son, Andrew; and; subsequently, son-in-law Todd; grandson Kolby; granddaughter Kayla; and grandson-in-law Bob.

I love and thank God for all of them.

To God be the glory for 55 years of exciting, challenging and fulfilling years of mission and ministry!



Following Jesus' footsteps

My friend Susan and I were excited to start our journey around Mount Rainier, Washington's highest point, and most famous

volcano. We had our backpacks and our micro spikes ready to go, and our trekking poles in hand.

Our goal was to finish the Wonderland Loop in five days, hiking through 93 miles of lowland forests and high-alpine areas. Two hours into the journey we hit snow, so we put on our micro spikes and kept on trekking, following the visible part of the trail. Then we hit a snow-covered mountain, and the trail was nowhere to be seen. We attempted to follow the trail on GPS, but it was steep and slick.

Once I ended up sliding downhill and was only able to stop by digging my trekking poles into the snow. That option did not feel safe, so we opted to follow the tree line up the mountain, clinging to limbs and pulling ourselves up one step at a time. We were eventually successful in reaching the top of the mountain and were able to get back on the trail.

When we reached the next snow-covered mountain, Susan assessed the situation, and we decided it would not be wise to continue since the trail had disappeared again, and there were no trees to hold on to. There was too much snow and ice. We needed to head back down, so we searched for the tree line we had used to summit the mountain.



We eased our way down the tree line, but it did not lead us back to the trail, so we headed back up the tree line and tried an alternate tree line. This ended in a deep, unpassable valley, so once again we had to pull ourselves up the tree line again. When our third attempt to go down failed, we realized we would need to camp on top of the mountain.

Thankfully, we were able to get a signal and called our good friend Paul Gossman, who is an amazing mountaineer with years of climbing experience. He agreed to come up the next day and help us get back down the mountain. He would bring extra equipment, ice axes, helmets and ropes.

The next morning Paul arrived, and he led us down a "winter route," which we did not know existed. He taught us how to dig our heels into the snow and secure ourselves with our trekking poles. Then he asked if we just wanted him to make footprints so that we could follow him step by step down the hill. We were excited to accept his offer to make us a path. As we walked in his footsteps, we were safe and secure.

Wow! What a picture of what our lives should resemble. We need to let Jesus make the path and then follow Him step by step.



Is your child or grandchild participating in the Texas CEF's K.I.D.S. Stamp Program? This program offers a perfect opportunity for

parents and grandparents to help the children in their lives learn financial responsibility and biblical stewardship skills in a captivating way.

The program provides a fun, convenient and engaging way for children to save money and allows us to help impact future generations. As the children save, they'll discover they're also playing an active role in supporting ministry efforts in Texas.

Over the years, hundreds of children have engaged in the K.I.D.S. Stamp Program, and now, many of them are parents themselves. Each \$1 stamp saved plays a vital role in advancing the Kingdom of God. Through the K.I.D.S. Stamp Program, we strive to uphold this legacy by empowering children to learn about discipleship, financial responsibility and stewardship. This program has

already made a profound impact across generations, and we are confident it will continue to benefit future ones.

How Does the K.I.D.S. Stamp Program Work?

When the child's church or school participates in the program, the CEF Stamp Rep will provide the children with a stamp booklet (map) for the child to fill out and opportunities to purchase \$1 stamps. When the child fills up their "stamp map," worth \$10, a new Flex Savings investment is either opened, or the stamps are added to their existing Flex Savings. The completed map can be mailed to Texas District Church Extension Fund. (Don't forget to fill out the information for the child and custodian).

Reaching the blind, visually impaired

Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) exists to bring the Word of God to the 338 million people throughout the world who are blind or visually impaired, free of charge, in braille and specialized large print. In over 80 years of ministry, LBW has produced and distributed over 15 million volumes of Christian materials in 40 languages in 164 countries. LBW has never charged a recipient to receive these materials as they believe in freely sharing God's Word!

Lutheran Braille Workers was awarded a \$20,000 Mission Grant at the 2024 LWML Texas District Convention. These funds will allow LBW, with the help of Texas volunteers, to produce about 2,500 volumes of new Bible studies, devotions, and materials in Spanish for prison ministry.

One major factor in LBW's ability to reach thousands of people every single year is the volunteer work force dedicated to sharing the Gospel. LBW has over 3,200 volunteers engaged across the country. Through Lutheran Braille Workers' partnership with the LWML and the countless volunteers in Texas and throughout the country, many who are blind or visually impaired will be able to experience the love of Christ for themselves.

Mission Grant proposals, officer nominations due Nov. 1
