A common cause

Lutheran Christians in the Texas
District have a common cause
— to reach people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ to make them
His followers.

In my brief remarks immediately after being elected district pres-

ident, I emphasized the common convictions that we share in our district, the common cause that we have, and the common community that we treasure. My column last month emphasized the importance of holding to our common convictions — our beliefs about what God's Word teaches. "Keep a close watch on yourself and on the teaching. Persist in this," St. Paul writes to Timothy (1 Tim. 4:16).

But that verse doesn't end there. It concludes like this: "...for by so doing you will save both yourself and your hearers." There is a purpose to pure teaching — the salvation of people, the eternal lives of those who hear the pure Good News that we hold near and dear!

Here's the point: if we truly believe what we say we believe (our convictions), we can't help but be about our missional cause.

That's true, in the first place, because our convictions have implications — missional implications. If, for instance, we believe that the only way to eternal salvation is through the grace of God shown to us in Jesus (John 14:6), that has real, eternal implications

for, well, everyone! It has great implications for those who trust in Jesus as their savior; it has grave implications for those who do not.

No wonder St. Paul writes "Christ's love compels us" (2 Cor. 5:14) to the ministry of reconciling people to God. We, who understand the grace of God and all its implications, absolutely must share that Good News with those who are far from God. We can't help it — it's a matter of their eternal destinies.

In the second place, our missional cause is one of our doctrinal convictions. God's Word is replete with references to the necessity of missional outreach. In addition to the passages in the paragraphs above, there are the words of Jesus himself: "...there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance" (Luke 15:7) and "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10). He's enlisted us in that holy effort: "Go and make disciples" (Matthew 28:18), and for which we are a "royal priesthood" (1 Peter 2:9).

There is an essential relationship between our convictions and our cause. Our convictions can't help but lead to missional zeal. And our missional zeal (our cause) must be for something that we hold dear (our convictions). Otherwise, what is there to be zealous about?

We maintain our convictions and engage in our cause best when we do so together — in common community. More on that to come....

A growing mission

On Aug. 14, Epiphany Lutheran Church, Bastrop, closed on 5.58 acres that will become the home base for its expanding ministry. A \$250,000 loan from the Texas District's Church Extension Fund enabled the young congrega-

tion to combine its own resources and purchase the property for \$360,000.

The land sits in a rural yet fast-growing part of Bastrop, about a mile south of TX Hwy 71 and near several new housing developments. Just a couple of miles away, a 1,500-home community has already opened a new elementary school.

Rev. E. B. Holschuh is quick to deflect credit for the church's progress, insisting he's still learning the ropes of planting a congregation. But his confidence in God's work through the Gospel, combined with his willingness to rely on the diverse gifts of others, has helped the church flourish.

Pastor Holschuh became Epiphany's first pastor on Jan. 6, 2024 — just eight months after the congregation chartered. The congregation's roots stretch back further, to when several area congregations joined forces to start a new ministry in Bastrop.

The name Epiphany Lutheran Church was chosen with a clear goal: to hold the first service near the Feast of the Epiphany in 2022. That vision became reality on Feb. 6, 2022, when 44 saints gathered for worship.

Today, the congregation meets at the Seventh-Day Adventist Church on TX Hwy 21, about 10 miles east of the new property. Plans are underway to begin worship on their own site, and members are excited to finally have a permanent home.

As the late Dr. Charles T. Knippel once wrote in *The Lutheran Witness*, "Epiphany has a remarkable 'epiphanizing' splendor all its own. ... God emboldens our faith and sets our lives ablaze to be what Christ calls us to be: the light of a dark world ... and revelations to others of Jesus' saving manifestations."

We must all be reminded of the example set by our Savior and adopt a servant's attitude if we are to live the legacy and build the community we desire.

Mission Grant Spotlight

Discipling youth for Gospel outreach

Glocal Mission, founded and led by Rev. Dr. David Kim, is a Christian non-profit organization based in Houston, focused on equipping and mobilizing people for disciple-making and church multiplication both locally and globally.

The \$12,000 LWML Texas District mission grant has enabled Glocal Mission to create specialized programming to gather, train and organize youth ministry leaders and youth evangelists in Houston for Christ-centered outreach. This mission grant also provides for training, materials, supplies, food for activities and outreach, and Gospel outreach resources.

In 2025, Glocal Mission trained over 125 students and youth ministry leaders in cross-cultural outreach, celebrated 79 baptisms, and equipped 28 churches with their 5-3-1 evangelism model and "Good-Better-Best" missional outcome framework.

Testimonials from youth and church leaders emphasize the transformative impact of the program, which empowers participants to actively share their faith and serve as disciple-makers. Various mission activities



include sharing the Gospel in parks, ministering to laborers and the homeless, assembling care packages, and engaging in cross-cultural training. The initiative has inspired a new generation of bold ambassadors for Christ.
